Articulate



2 Products:

- Studio 13 – Presenter, Quizmaker, Engage
 - Pros: quick start, support community, import quizzes
 - Cons: expensive, not too flexible, HTML5 versions
- Storyline
 - Pros: very flexible; good for HTML5, built for the future
 - Cons: expensive & steep learning curve

* Just released Articulate 360 (includes Studio & Storyline).

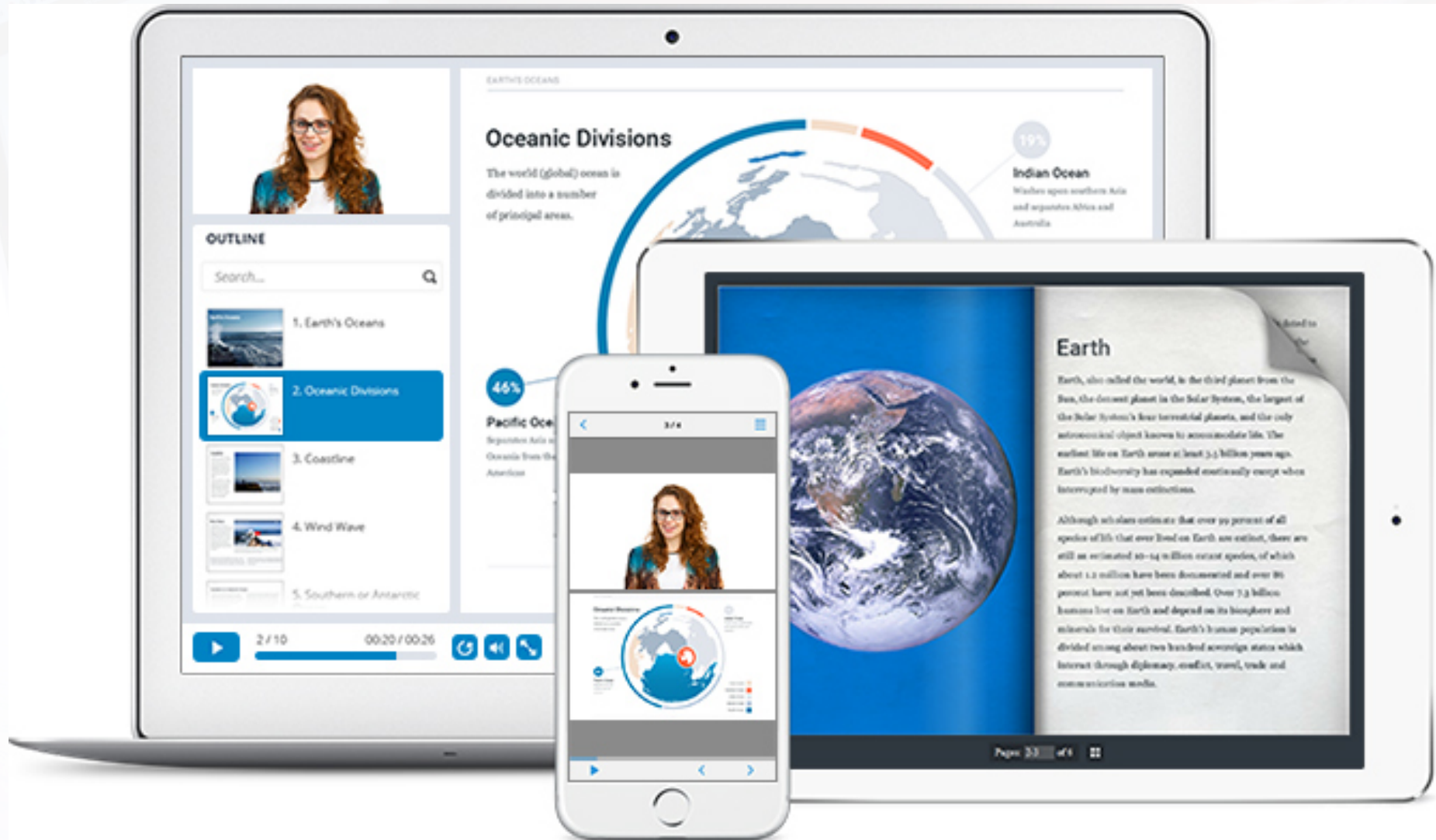


Suite 8:

- Rationalized product line into Suite 8 (2016)
 - Pros: best HTML5 support, stable, screen capture, output to video, good value
 - Cons: support not as visible as Articulate (but OK), upgrade costs

* Also have a more basic presentation only version and a free PPT converter

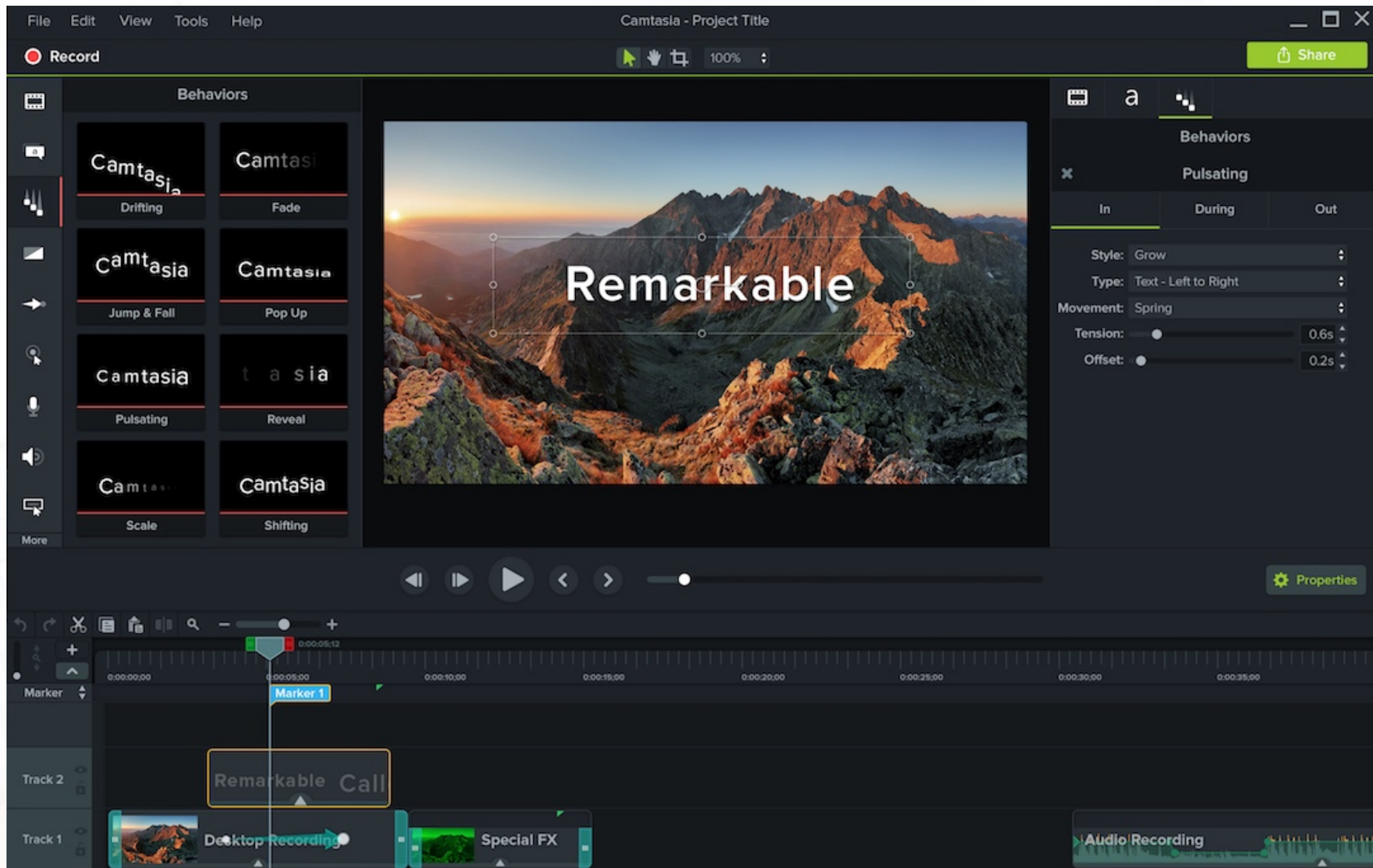
Camtasia



Camtasia Studio 8:

- Known mainly for screen capture but has other eLearning features (import PPT, quizzes, audio)
 - Pros: powerful video editing, combine multiple content types, good value
 - Cons: eLearning features not as developed as other options, PPT is captured by video so not as crisp as Articulate/iSpring
- * Has a Mac version but doesn't include quiz maker.

A key advantage of using eLearning content is the ability to track and report user activity.

- SCORM – Traditional LMS
- Non-Traditional LMS?
 - Tin Can / LRS
 - Analytics: Google, PiWik, GetClicky

Deliver your Courses

- What is an LMS?
- Do you need an LMS?
- Options:
 - Commercial
 - Open-source
 - Wordpress

Common Elements of an LMS

- ✓ Organize content (courses)
- ✓ Display content (lessons)
- ✓ Manage users (roles/groups)
- ✓ User reporting (analytics)
- ✓ Assessment (quiz/assignment)
- ✓ **Progress determined by assessment**

LMS Options

3 paths:

- Open-source: M, D, S
- Commercial: B, L, eF, Mc, Ar & iS
- Wordpress
- DIY

Wordpress LMS

Why I think Wordpress makes most sense:

- Need a WP site for marketing
- Minimal cost (not SaS)
- Setup & maintenance
- Extensibility
- Complete control

Wordpress LMS – Common Elements

- Courses, Lessons, Modules & Quizzes
- Automated progression
- Proprietary
- Extendable
- eCommerce

SENSEI

- One of first LMS plugins for Wordpress
- Developed by Woo Themes
- Pros: clean, unified, solid
- Cons: inflexible, development pace, basic quizzes.

LEARNDASH

- Developed from a collection of other plugins
- Maturing
- Pros: comprehensive, extendable, powerful quiz features
- Cons: complex, over developed

Other LMS Plugins

- WP Courseware
- CoursePress (Courses)
- Lifter LMS
- Namaste
- LearnPress
- WP LMS

Content Approach – Platform Agnostic

- Separate learning content from LMS
- Link/iframe the content in the lessons
- Easier to switch LMS/site/theme
- Simpler lesson structure
- Safer/harder to copy
- Use LMS quizzes for progression

Tips & Tricks

- Do keep a clean original of each lesson as a regular WP post.
- Do separate learning content (link/ iFrame).
- Do demo/test courses as a regular user.
- Don't edit live courses (add/delete lessons).
- Don't update immediately (staging site).
